Article 1: Purpose of the university

In accordance with the provisions of the Fundamentals of Education Act (2006 act No. 120) and School Education Act (1947 act No. 26), the purpose of Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen University (hereafter, "this University") is to contribute to the advancement of local communities and international society by conducting deeply specialized academic teaching and research based on the Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen founding spirit of *Kyuri-Jissen* (integration of theory with practice), and by producing members of society who have a highly-developed sense of humanity and comprehensive decision-making abilities.

Article 4: Faculties, departments, and admission capacities

2. The objectives related to development of human resources and other objectives of education and research in the faculties and departments that are established by this University are the following.

(1) Faculty of Social Information Science

The objectives are to carry out comprehensive education and research through the various social, humanities, and natural science departments in the areas of economics, the environment, information, welfare, and health improvements, and to produce persons who will contribute to local communities and international society.

1) Department of Global Business

This department develops persons who understand the true nature of globalization from a sociological and social informatics perspective, and who can identify and find solutions to the issues faced by modern society. In particular, it will develop "sociologists in business" – persons who apply sociological knowledge and analysis abilities to the practice of business, and who can thereby address the various issues which are produced by globalization.

2) Department of Health and Welfare

This department conducts broad-ranging research concerning ways of living healthy and fulfilling lives from beginning to end, and carries out knowledge and skills education aimed at developing the abilities needed to resolve problems in this field and contribute widely to society. In particular, it produces persons who have the specialized knowledge and skills required for resolving problems related to health improvements, preventive long-term care, and welfare, and who can contribute to the development of prosperous and healthy communities.

(2) Faculty of Nursing

The objectives of this department are to carry out comprehensive education and research in fields related to nursing in cooperation with other related academic fields, and to develop professional nursing caregivers who can meet the ever-changing health needs of people and contribute to local communities and international society.

1) Department of Nursing

This school uses a system of practical education and research to develop specialist nursing professionals who are possessed of a deep sensitivity based on a reverence for life and ethical awareness, a global perspective, specialist knowledge and practical skills, the ability to resolve a broad range of problems that require solutions, and the ability to continue learning on their own throughout their lives, and who can contribute to local communities and international society.

(3) Faculty of Arts and Sciences

The purpose of this faculty is to carry out far-reaching interdisciplinary education and research in a wide range of arts and science fields in order to develop persons who can contribute to local communities and international society. Its basic principle is the training of educators with a well-developed sense of humanity who will work to develop society by developing its individuals. Through collaboration with the Department of Children's Studies and Department of Music in this faculty, it will produce persons with a strong foundation of advanced specialized skills and the ability to understand and teach human beings, who will not only contribute to local culture and education, but will also contribute to the advancement of the local community culture that joints individuals together.

1) Department of Children's Studies

This department conducts interdisciplinary research in various fields related to children, focused on child growth and development during all stages of infancy and childhood. It aims to develop the abilities to resolve problems in these areas and to provide learning and skills that will be of broad use to society. In particular, it will produce persons who can contribute in practical and leadership ways in support of children and child-raising in places such as families, schools, and societies.

2) Department of Music

The musical arts require top-level abilities, and are important as an endeavor of the human spirit and essential for character formation. The Department of Music carries out theoretical musical education, performance skills education, and education aimed at building a broad range of learning and deep human understanding. It aims to produce persons who can contribute to the advancement of music culture in local communities by developing persons who have expert musical knowledge and performance skills, as well as a deep insight into the importance of music in forming the human character, and who are capable of bearing responsibility for local music culture and music education.

2) Purpose and admission capacity of the Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen University Graduate School <From the Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen University Regulations>

Article 1: Purpose of the graduate school

The Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen University Graduate School (hereafter, "this University Graduate School") is committed to "dialogue-based education" based on the Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen founding spirit of *Kyuri-Jissen* (integration of theory with practice). Its purpose is to carry out education and research to develop the deep academic learning and superior abilities which are needed to engage in professions that require a high level of expertise, and to raise these levels further to develop expert academic theory and applications, seeking answers to mysteries and contributing to the advancement of culture.

Article 5: Graduate school degree programs, purpose, and admissions capacity

- 2. The objectives of education and research, and the objectives related to development of human resources, in the graduate schools and degree programs to be established at this University Graduate School are the following.
- (1) Graduate School of Social Information Science

Education and research in the Graduate School of Social Information Science is aimed at unraveling the causal relationships which lay behind various complex interrelated phenomena in society. The fundamental purpose of the social sciences is to examine results from various natural sciences and subject them to interdisciplinary and comprehensive research by applying methods from information sciences.

1) Master's program

The Master's program aims to provide education for specialist professionals who have advanced expert knowledge that can contribute to local communities and international society in socioeconomic activities, the environment, and other areas of our increasingly information-oriented society.

2) Doctoral program

The Doctoral program is based on the Master's program and aims to develop high-level experts who can identify and resolve problems and also carry out research at universities, research institutions, and corporate R&D departments.

(2) Graduate School of Nursing

1) Master's program

The Graduate School of Nursing Master's program is based on nursing knowledge and skills, and provides education to deepen academic knowledge in the nursing field, develop scientific thinking skills and clinically-oriented research abilities that can be applied to resolve nursing problems and carry out improvements, and develop the abilities of leaders, administrators, and educators with a high sense of ethics in the nursing workplace.

2) Doctoral program

The Doctoral program engages in clinically-oriented research related to health needs with the high levels of academic learning, ability for action, and ethical sense needed to engage in advanced, specialized work. It aims to develop advanced nursing professionals who can contribute to improving nursing practice and education, and who have the abilities and teaching skills of an independent researcher who can work for mutually-reinforcing advances in research and practice, and can advance the field of nursing as a practical science.

(3) Graduate School of Education

1) Master's program

This program aims to develop persons who have a sense of mission and responsibility regarding teaching, who have acquired advanced knowledge and skills supported by a love of teaching, and who are equipped with a wide-ranging set of human abilities that allows them to coordinate and collaborate in the workplace and with diverse organizations in the local community. Ultimately it aims to produce persons who can meet society's needs for training of educators.

3) Purpose and admission capacity of the Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen Two-year College <From the Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen Two-year College Regulations>

Article 1: Purpose

The purpose of Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen Two-year College (hereafter, "this College") is, in accordance with the provisions of the Fundamentals of Education Act and School Education Act, to contribute to the advancement of local communities and international society by conducting deeply specialized academic teaching and research based on the Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen founding spirit of *Kyuri-Jissen* (integration of theory with practice), and by cultivating the abilities needed for work and actual living, as well as broad-based and deep learning and comprehensive decision-making abilities, and a highly-developed sense of humanity.

- (1) Department of Community Living Studies

The objective of this department is to develop a broad range of specialized knowledge and skills related to

food, shelter, clothing, human relationships, and other lifestyle issues in order to produce persons who can contribute to the creation of highly diverse lifestyles and to the development of culture in local communities.

(2) Department of Food and Nutrition

The objective of this department is to develop a broad range of specialized knowledge and skills related to food and health in order to produce persons who can provide guidance as nutritionists for the creation of healthy and richly human lifestyles.

(3) Department of Early Childhood Education

The objective of this department is to develop a broad range of specialized knowledge and skills related to child-raising and early childhood education in order to produce early childhood educators who are equipped with the practical abilities and highly-developed sense of humanity needed to meet the diverse needs of society.

Based on the fundamental knowledge of specialized subjects that was acquired at the two-year college, the objective of this major is to teach more detailed and far-reaching specialized theory and skills related to early childhood education in order to develop top-level early childhood caregivers who can be leaders at early childhood education and welfare facilities.

(2) Major in Nutrition

Based on the fundamental knowledge of specialized subjects that was acquired at the two-year college, the objective of this major is to teach more detailed and far-reaching specialized theory and skills related to nutrition in order to develop top-level nutritionists who can carry out nutritional education for improving health.

(3) Major in Lifestyles

Based on the fundamental knowledge of specialized subjects that was acquired at the two-year college, the objective of this major is to teach more detailed and far-reaching specialized theory and skills related to lifestyles and particularly to clothing and food, and to provide instruction for research in this area.

7) Learning evaluations (all departments)

(Recognition of credit acquisition)

- 1) Persons who are recognized as having completed the study of each course shall be awarded credits.
- 2) The method for recognition of credit acquisition shall be by test, academic paper, or other means. Timing of tests or other evaluations:
- 1) The timing of the test or other evaluation shall in general be the end of the academic term or the end of the academic year. However, such evaluations may be held at other times when deemed necessary by the person in charge of each course.

Requirements for taking the test or other evaluation:

1) A person who was not registered for the course at the beginning of the academic term, or a person who failed to produce adequate results in terms of research and attendance, may not take the test or other evaluation.

Make-up test:

1) A person who was unable to take a test or other evaluation due to illness or other unavoidable circumstance, and who was approved by the faculty committee, may be given an opportunity for a make-up test.

Learning evaluations and retesting:

- 1) Test and other evaluations shall be indicated as superior (S), excellent (A), good (B), acceptable (C), and unacceptable (D). C and higher shall be considered passing grades.
- 2) Standards for results and evaluations shall be as follows. 90 100 points: superior (S), 80 89 points: excellent (A), 70 79 points: good (B), 60 69 points: acceptable (C), 0 59 points: unacceptable (D).
- 3) A student who fails to pass but who is approved by the faculty committee may be granted an opportunity for a retest.

1. Founding spirit

The founding spirit of Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen University and Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen Two-year College is *Kyuri-Jissen* (Integration of Theory with Practice). These words were suggested by former director and president Dr. Seiji Sakata, who translated "Theoria cum Praxi" into Japanese. "Theoria com Praxi" are words of the great German philosopher G.W. Leibniz, recognized as one of the fathers of modern thinking. It is in the great efforts made to bring theory and practice together – areas which by their nature contain the potential for contradiction – that the potential for human growth can be found. This is also where the force that will drive social and scientific advancement lies, and was chosen as the motto to represent the founding spirit of our school.

This expresses the approach of our school to education, research, and human resource development as we aim to combine the pursuit of theory and practice into a single entity. It also expresses our dedication to continual learning comprising the pursuit of theory to be confirmed by practice, and the use of practice to verify and improve theory.

We have given this founding spirit a prominent position in our school so that it can continue to be a place where both students and faculty strive for human growth through continual pursuit of *Kyuri-Jissen*.

2. Gakuen missions

The three missions of Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen are the following: 1) Expand access to and the scope of higher education, 2) Develop a broad range of human resources, 3) Contribute to local communities and international exchange.

- Expanding access to and the scope of higher education:

In order to approach the ideal of higher education that is available to everyone, and to meet the needs of a universal access age, we have established a variety of mechanisms such as the AO entrance examination system and are striving to expand access to and the scope of higher education.

- Developing a broad range of human resources:

Based on the founding spirit of *Kyuri-Jissen*, we have created three faculties and eight departments to develop a wide range of human resources who are equipped with practical abilities related to "fulfillment" and "health". We have also created a graduate school at the university and majors at the two-year college to develop human resources with more specialized abilities.

- Contributing to local communities and international exchange:

Our educational resources are made available to local residents, primarily in the Hiroshima and Kure areas. The departments are primarily in charge of conducting the open courses, performances, lectures, and volunteer activities, as well as sending personnel to a variety of events conducted by outside organizations, operating a variety of courses for residents at the Lifelong Learning Center, making school facilities and libraries available for use by outside persons, and carrying out activities that contribute to local communities.

In terms of international exchange, we have concluded agreements with universities in China and the Philippines, and are carrying out faculty exchanges, student exchanges, training, and other educational and research exchange. We are also actively participating in domestic exchange programs conducted within Japan.

3. Operating policy: "Dialog-based education, dialog-based management"

Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen places great value on the relationships expressed by the philosophy of "dialogue" developed by Martin Buber (1878 - 1965), one of the greatest 20th century philosophers. "Hooper dialogue" is a means of finding points of contact between two matters that at first appear contradictory and developing the relationship between them in a good direction.

In education, the relationship between students and faculty is extremely important, and we utilize this dialogue to maintain good educational relationships. This process is also known in Japan by the expression "oumei education". This term describes the use of dialogue to easily express the educational environment through words similar to an exchange of chirps between a baby bird and its mother. In research, *Kyuri-Jissen* does sometime produce contradictions, however we strive to achieve both theory and practice through the concept of dialogue.

In operating our school, we have also used dialogue to construct good relationships of cooperation between the management and teaching faculty, between the university and two-year college, and between the faculty and administrative staff.

2) Financial status of Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen

Following is an explanation of the following items concerning the financial status of Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen, and rules and documents related to the finances of an incorporated educational institution.

- 1. Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen income and expenditures for academic year 2014
- 2. Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen income and expenditure trends

1. Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen income and expenditures for academic year 2014

Income and expenditures for academic year 2014 are shown in Table 1 (Consumption Statement of Income and Expenditures).

Total imputed income for academic year 2014 was approximately 2.794 billion yen, while total consumption expenditures were approximately 2.338 billion yen, resulting in a profit of approximately. 456 million yen.

- Imputed income refers to the main income of the school, including payments from students (tuition and others), grants, and contributions. Although there is income from borrowing, income which requires repayment to an outside entity is not included in imputed income.
- Net income is the amount of the above imputed income minus the amount of transfers to the capital funds.

This capital funds are funds which are built up for use as university operating funds and funds for future purchases of equipment. There is a type of fund where the amount of investment is prescribed by law, and a type where the amount of investment is decided according to the university's operating plan.

• Consumption expenditures are expenses paid for operation of the university, including personnel expenses and education and research costs.

2. Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen income and expenditure trends

Table 1 shows the one-year consumption income and expenditures for academic year 2014. Figure 1 shows the changes in income and expenditures (imputed income and consumption expenditures) for the most recent five years.

Due to the establishment of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences at Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen University in academic year 2010, student capacity and income increased, and the status of income and expenditures has been improving. The specific figures used to create Figure 1 are shown in Table 2 (Changes in Consumption Income and Expenditures).

Following is an explanation of the characteristic items from Table 2 (Changes in Consumption Income and Expenditures).

[1] Payments from students, etc.:

These have been increasing since academic year 2010 due to the establishment of new faculties, graduate schools, and other programs.

[2] Grant income:

Because large-scale installation of information devices was carried out in academic year 2011, there was a temporary increase in grant income in academic year 2012.

In academic years 2013 and 2014, there was an increase in grant income in areas including comprehensive support for private university reform and anti-seismic construction.

[3] Miscellaneous income:

Differences occur in each year due to fluctuations in grant income from the retirement allowance foundation.

(Linked with retirement payments in personnel expenses.)

[4] Personnel expenses:

Beginning from academic year 2010, personnel expenses have been increasing due to the construction of a faculty organization for establishment of new faculties and addition of graduate school doctoral courses. We began working to reduce personnel expenses beginning from academic year 2013, and personnel expenses have been declining.

[5] Loss on sale of assets:

The amount equivalent to the decrease in book value is recorded as a loss due to sale of equipment and other assets. In academic year 2012, we recorded a one-time large loss due to the sale of some land and buildings.

3. Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen financial ratios




Figure 2: Ratio of Imputed Income to

The financial ratios for the most recent five years are here explained using Figures 2-4. The national average that is used for comparison is the figure listed for "Other Multiple Faculty" in *Kyou no Shigaku Zaisei*, published by the Promotion and Mutual Aid Corporation for Private Schools of Japan.

[1] Ratio of imputed income to expenditures:

This ratio is calculated as follows: (Imputed income – Consumption expenditures) / Imputed income. A positive value indicates excess income, and a negative value indicates excess expenditures. The blue line in Figure 2 (Ratio of Imputed Income to Expenditures) shows the ratios of expenditures to income at this school over the past five years. The ratio of imputed income to expenditures has been improving due to the establishment of new faculties, graduate schools, and other programs.

[2] Ratio of education and research costs:

This ratio is calculated as follows: Education and research costs / Imputed income. It indicates the percentage of school income that is used to fund education and research.




Figure 3: Ratio of Education and Research Costs (Education and research costs / Imputed income)

The blue line in Figure 3 (Ratio of Education and Research Costs) indicates the ratio of education and research costs to the income of the school. Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen is maintaining a ratio that his higher than the national average.

[3] Ratio of personnel expenses:

This ratio is calculated as follows: Personnel expenses / Imputed income. It indicates the percentage of personnel expenses relative to school income.




Figure 4: Ratio of Personnel Expenses (Personnel expenses / Imputed Income)

The blue line in Figure 4 (Ratio of Personnel Expenses) indicates the ratio of personnel expenses to the income of the school. The ratio is declining as a result of a review of basic salaries and a reduction in bonuses.

4. Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen financial status (summary)

At present, the environment surrounding incorporated educational institutions in Japan is extremely difficult. As shown in Figure 1 (Imputed Income and Consumption Expenditures), the budget of Hiroshima Bunka Gakuen shows income in excess of expenditures (a figure which corresponds approximately to profit) due to reorganization of faculties and departments. However because income becomes fixed in the year in which the new faculties are completed, it will be necessary to continue working to reduce expenditures. We will continue working to improve our financial status without harming the quality of our education and research so that we can continue to provide higher education opportunities into the future.
